- 2. Explain the importance of public service motivation in the civil service.
- 3. Define the roles of public managers, including relationships to elected officials, boards, and citizens.
- 4. Define the role of public managers in policy making, policy implementation, and policy regulation.
- 5. Compare management in the public and private sectors; their similarities and differences, and the ways in which the sectors can work collaboratively.
- 6. Discuss entrepreneurial public management.
- 7. Identify major trends in the changing managerial environment, the challenges they present for public managers, and the skills needed to address them.
